'IT'S A GREAT DAY FOR THE IRISH'

SAINT Patrick's Day will be celebrated across the globe on the 17th March this year. Sometimes it is moved to an alternative date to avoid a clash with Holy Week (the week before Easter). This last happened in 2008 and will not happen again until 2160! St Patrick was born in Britain in the fourth century. When he was just a teenager it is said that he was captured by Irish raiders and taken back to Ireland to work as a slave. He managed to escape captivity, but later in life returned to Ireland to Christianise the country.

St Patrick used the shamrock, or three-leafed clover, to explain the doctrine of the Trinity to the Irish, who at that time practised polytheism, a religion of many gods. The Trinity defines God as three people: the Father; the Son; and the Holy Spirit. After St Patrick's death, there were more successful missions to Ireland from the Roman Empire, but he is remembered as the key figure in Christianising Ireland. The shamrock is now a symbol of Ireland and the colour green is associated with St Patrick's Day.

In 1903 St Patrick's Day became an official public holiday for Ireland and since 1996 the day has been observed with a Festival lasting several days. The Festival includes concerts, outdoor theatre and fireworks.

In Argentina, St Patrick's Day is celebrated with all-night parties in designated streets in the towns and cities, especially in Buenos Aires. People dance and drink beer throughout the night and most wear something green.

In Australia and New Zealand St Patrick's Day is a popular celebration. There are many links with Ireland in these countries as many Irish people emigrated, or were brought as convicts, there in the 19th century.

Both South Korea and Japan have been celebrating St Patrick's Day with parades and festivals for several years in their major cities.
